Course Overview

This course is designed for students to master the nuanced communication strategies required in business environments. Rather than focusing on rote memorization, we analyze how idiomatic language and jargon serve as a strategic tool for leadership, conflict resolution, and building cross-cultural rapport in the international business community.

Learning Objectives

Upon completion of this course, participants will be able to:

- **Strategize Communication:** Deploy idiomatic expressions to convey precise, nuanced meanings in high-pressure negotiations and daily interactions.
- **Navigate Organizational Dynamics:** Analyze and manage cross-cultural scenarios where language impacts team cohesion and project outcomes.
- **Demonstrate Leadership:** Execute a team-based corporate simulation that demonstrates mastery of professional vernacular.
- **Enhance Executive Presence:** Build rapport and interpret subtle conversational cues to gain a competitive edge in global markets.

Weekly Schedule

Phase I: Operational Efficiency & Influence

- **Week 1: Operational Pressure & Time Management** Managing workloads and expressing urgency through idioms like *the eleventh hour* and *a tall order*.
- **Week 2: Organizational Behavior & Alliance Building** Navigating workplace dynamics, maintaining composure, and building professional "back up".
- **Week 3: Integrity & Persuasion Strategy** Gaining stakeholder support and maintaining ethical stances during campaigning (*stick to your guns*).
- **Week 4: Entrepreneurial Risk & Success Evaluation** Calculating risks (*go out on a limb*) and analyzing the "tip of the iceberg" in business ventures.

Phase II: Midterm Deliverables

- **Week 5–7: Corporate Simulation Workshop & Screening** Teams draft, record, and present their business case studies for peer critique.
- **Week 8: Midterm Executive Assessment**

Phase III: Advanced Strategy & Conflict Resolution

- **Week 9: Cultural Intelligence & Office Politics** Identifying "fishy" situations and managing unspoken organizational issues.
- **Week 10: Competitive Strategy & Deal-Making** Negotiating "package deals" and making executive calls when on the fence.
- **Week 11: Crisis Management & High-Stakes Negotiation** Handling "hardball" tactics and maintaining emotional control (*cool as a cucumber*).
- **Week 12: Business Acumen & Problem Solving** Zeroing in on key issues and identifying decisions that fall "above our pay grade".

Phase IV: Final Evaluation

- **Week 13: Media Analysis: The Corporate Lens** Deconstructing communication styles in industry media.
- **Week 14–15: Final Review & Comprehensive Executive Exam**

Course Description

Due to the rapidly changing global village, citizens from around the world are facing different challenges as they communicate with each other. In cross cultural communication, individuals must learn to appreciate and embrace differences in order to communicate effectively. This course aims at allowing international and domestic students the opportunity to explore each other's differences not only in language but in non-verbal communication which is imbedded in their own communication styles.

International students are paired with domestic students in "iChats" which is a program to help international and domestic students a chance to practice each other's languages and through this interaction, gain cross-cultural understanding.

International students are also exposed to a variety of cultural experiences inside and outside of the classroom in order to gain firsthand knowledge of Korean culture. Cultural experiences vary depending on the semester but may include, taekwondo, traditional games & sports, Kpop dance, etc .

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Course Description

This course is designed for professionals and students aiming to master the **strategic communication** required for success in the global digital economy. Moving beyond basic communication fluency, the curriculum focuses on building **cross-cultural leadership competencies** and high-level negotiation skills.

Participants will analyze and navigate complex corporate scenarios within the **Finance/FinTech and Digital Marketing sectors**. By mastering specialized industry jargon, idiomatic professional expressions, and persuasive rhetorical techniques, students will learn to build rapport and execute business objectives with precision. The primary goal is to empower students to adapt their communication styles to diverse, fast-paced international environments

Core Competencies & Learning Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, participants will demonstrate the ability to:

- **Master Professional Lexicon:** Command the specific jargon, idioms, and nuances of the Finance and Digital Marketing industries.
 - **Strategic Application:** Execute sophisticated business communication in both verbal and written formats.
 - **Scenario Analysis:** Critically evaluate and respond to complex scenarios, including funding rounds, M&A activity, and global marketing campaigns.
 - **High-Stakes Persuasion:** Develop and deliver compelling pitches using industry-standard persuasive frameworks.
 - **Active Executive Listening:** Synthesize and interpret complex business English in diverse professional contexts.
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Executive Assessment & Grading

Performance is evaluated based on professional application and active engagement in corporate simulations.

- **Individual Short-form Video Pitch (Capstone Project): 30 Points**
 - This is the primary summative assessment. Students will produce a 2-minute executive-level video pitch for a product or service.
 - The pitch must demonstrate a sophisticated command of industry jargon and persuasive communication to influence a target audience.
- **Corporate Engagement & Executive Quizzes: 50 Points**
 - Includes active contribution to strategic discussions, completion of technical in-class simulations, and performance on two module-specific competency quizzes.
- **Professional Attendance: 20 Points**
- **Total: 100 points**
